As the training progressed, the 4-H volunteer leaders responded to a question posed by the 4-H agents regarding program topic ideas. The leaders suggested a handful of possible topics but settled on the importance of helping youth better manage stress and overall mental health. The leaders' identification of this need is spot on.

A 2020 study conducted on behalf of the National 4-H Council found 45% of teens surveyed say they ignore their mental health issues. Even before COVID-19, 81% of teens identified mental health issues as a significant issue for young people in the United States. Eighty-two percent of teens surveyed responded it is time for Americans to talk more openly and honestly about mental health issues.

So, what can we do? As adults, we can and should always provide a safe space for youth to share their thoughts, feelings, and struggles. We need to communicate to youth they should never stop being honest about their mental health and reach out to adults who can help when they are struggling.

We can provide youth with tools for better recognizing and managing stress. These tools might include journaling about feelings; expressing emotions through art, music, or other creative projects; mindful breathing; meditation; and laughter. Research shows laughter can boost your immune system, ease pain, relax the body, and reduce stress.



We can encourage youth (and ourselves) to make healthy decisions about what we eat and drink and how we care for our bodies including making exercise and sleep priorities.

Just like adults, youth need reminding to treat themselves (and each other) with kindness, to value their strengths, engage in hobbies, and to surround themselves with supportive family members and friends who respect and love them.

We can engage youth in service to others. A 2021 study by the Mayo Clinic reported volunteering reduces stress and increases positive, relaxed feelings. Volunteers report a sense of meaning and appreciation, both given and received, which can have a stress-reducing effect.

The 4-H program structure provides a safe, inclusive environment where youth feel a sense of belonging and connection and where youth engage in

### **Horse Certificates Must be Renewed**

Horse Certificates need to be done every year or renewed every year with approval of the County Agent. The horse certificate is a form similar to a registration form. You can find it on the 4-H website under "Forms and Publications." They are due on May 2 to the County Extension Office (not the State 4-H Office).

Horses get sold, traded, and/or leased and this is the purpose of doing them each year. This is a unique aspect to the project. Horse Certificates are required for any sanctioned 4-H horse show. The only way that the agent can verify that the horse being used is the project horse, is for a 4-H member to document that they are the exhibitor, lessee, or owner of that particular horse. Some counties also require those 4-H members in the rodeo project to submit horse certificates. It is strongly recommended that 4-H members submit a horse certificate for any horse that they may use as their project for the year.



#### 4-H Horse School

4-H Horse School is scheduled for June 6-9, 2022. Location and other details are still to be determined.

### 2-Year-Old Western Pleasure **Futurity and 3-Year-Old Versatility Nominations**

4-H'ers with advanced skills in horsemanship are eligible to nominate a two-year-old horse for the Western Pleasure Futurity and Showmanship classic held each year during the State Fair 4-H Horse Show. Nominations are due in the State 4-H Office by May 2 of the current year.

Horses eligible for the two-year-old Western Pleasure Futurity must be totally green, that is, having never received any riding by ANYONE other than the 4-H'er who nominates the horse to the Futurity. During the State 4-H Fair Horse Show, the horses will participate in three go-rounds of Western Pleasure.

The horses properly nominated as two-year-olds to the Futurity are eligible the following year to enter the three-year-old Versatility Class. Advice and counsel on training techniques may come from outside sources, however, the 4-H member must do all the riding and work on the Versatility horse.

The Versatility Class is held during the State Fair 4-H Horse Show. Nominations for the Versatility Class are due to the State 4-H Office by May 2 of the current year. Nomination forms and complete rules are available on the 4-H website under "Horse and Livestock Events." There is a \$20.00 nomination fee.

#### 4-H Rodeo Rule Book

(This is available to view on the NM 4-H website)

There is an important rule change in the 4-H Rodeo Rulebook:



All contestants must have personal accident insurance and a signed and completed Consent and Assumption of Risk Form in the State 4-H Office 15 days prior to the participant's first rodeo of the current year in order for the member to compete in Sanctioned 4-H Rodeos. This includes the completion of the rodeo safety course.



# **Shooting Sports State Championships**

The New Mexico State 4-H Shooting Sports Championships will be held in Raton at the NRA Whittington Center **May 5-8, 2022**. This will be an in-person event this year.

Please make sure to book lodging as soon as possible as there will be another large youth shooting sports program holding their contest at the same time. Stay in communication with your county 4-H agent for deadlines and contest registration.

The Senior Leadership Retreat was an amazing learning experience! All of the workshops and clinics were incredibly informative and gave me so much to think about in regard to my future. Going into the weekend, I had assumed that the clinics would revolve around ways to improve your leadership skills within 4-H. I figured that we would learn new games and activities to utilize at club meetings, which I did, but that wasn't the half of it!

I learned so much more than that. I like to think that the theme of the weekend was, "You're already a 4-H leader, what now?" This question permeated the air throughout every single activity. You're already a 4-H leader, now what do you want to do? With your life? With your education? With your career? There was workshop after helpful workshop chock full of information. Information on how leadership skills that I've picked up in 4-H will transfer into the real world. Information on how a career can build on my 4-H experiences. They even went so far as to show us just what career fields someone with our specific talents and knowledge would fare best in. They showed where we would already have a leg up on our competition. They explored so many avenues, highlighting the many ins and outs of an agriculture-based lifestyle.

Every aspect of the weekend was eye-opening, from wandering around the campus, getting insight on the many possible agricultural majors offered, and playing ice breaker games. # **Goal Setting: A Lifelong Constant**

We've all heard the saying "the only constant is change." Another constant in life is the necessity of having goals. Goals come in many forms including large lifetime goals, daily goals, hourly goals, and long, medium- and short-term goals spread throughout our days, months, and years.

Helping youth understand and recognize the benefits of setting goals can be challenging. One advantage of working with 4-H youth is they are participating because they want to, have an interest and are excited about the projects and activities in which they are participating. All we need to do is be creative and intentional in incorporating and enhancing goal setting into those activities and projects.

Recognizing and celebrating an accomplishment whether they reached a goal or completed a small step towards a larger goal, motivates, encourages and reinforces the value of setting and reaching goals. The more successes young people experience, no matter how small, the more they will be encouraged to continue practicing goal setting.

The following are some benefits youth experience when setting and reaching goals.

**Provides direction** - Youth create a path to success by setting goals. The process allows them to create a plan to reach their dreams. Having goals gives youth a direction and sense of purpose, reducing the chance they will wander aimlessly.

**Teaches responsibility** - Learning to set goals reinforces that their success or failures are a direct reflection of their effort. Tracking their progress helps youth to see how their action or inaction impacts their ability to reach their goals.

**Motivates** - When youth reach their goals, they learn to believe in themselves and their abilities. This builds self-esteem and the confidence to persist through challenges. The greatest replicator of success is success.

**Teaches time management** – Developing and following a goal action plan gives youth a visible timeline increasing their awareness and sense of time. Setting timelines and deadlines for goals helps to hold youth accountable for how they use their time.


