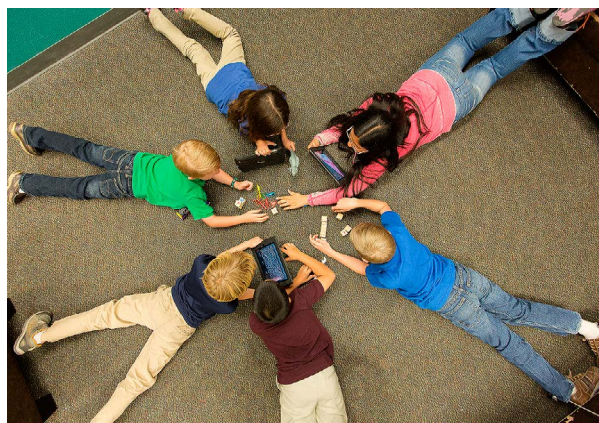

This past year, youth (and adults) experienced an even bumpier ride as the pandemic brought out feelings including but not limited to uncertainty, fear, anxiety, and loss. The 4-H program’s focus on social, physical, and emotional well-being (the

4-H Essential Elements) assists youth in navigating the sometimes “bumpy” road while providing opportunities for youth to develop skills and confidence helping them reach their full potential.

Volunteers play a huge role in guiding and supporting youth through their journey to young adulthood. One way volunteers achieve

in leadership roles in their club, community, and state. Research suggests strong, supportive partnerships between youth and adults can influence a young person's long-term involvement in and satisfaction with the 4-H program as well as their willingness and comfort in participating in leadership positions.

Below are a few strategies to consider when working with and growing young leaders.

- Take time to thoroughly explain leadership roles and opportunities. Youth and families may be longtime 4-H members; however, that does not necessarily mean there is full understanding of the leadership roles and opportunities at the club, county, and state levels.
- Be clear about time commitment and expectations associated with leadership positions. This is not to discourage youth but instead to help youth be successful in their leadership role by preparing them and their families prior to making a commitment.
- Keep expectations reasonable. Youth are immensely capable, but like all of us, have demands on their time and other commitments.
- Youth can sometimes be easily discouraged especially when a situation is new and challenges their comfort level. Allow youth time to express their fears, thoughts, and ideas without interrupting. Then, work with the youth to address concerns pointing out the young person's strengths and abilities.
- Look for youth's strengths. Verbalize and celebrate those strengths as a tool for building confidence. In addition, be mindful of areas where there is opportunity for improvement; and provide youth with tools for making these improvements.
- Put youth in real-life situations requiring problem solving as a tool for developing leadership qualities.
- Ask for and expect youth involvement in decision-making at all ages. When youth feel they have a voice, they are much more engaged and confidence grows.
- Trust youth, particularly teens, with responsibility; but remember the importance of gentle reminders. All of us need this.
- Maintain positivity and a sense of humor!

Leadership opportunities help youth learn responsibility, teamwork, problem-solving, organization, and communication skills. These skills not only grow a strong 4-H club and program, they prepare youth with confidence and important skills to better navigate through life.

Thank you for your continuing commitment to youth and to the 4-H program.

Navigating Life's Transitions: Helping youth manage through change

"The only thing that is constant is change."

Managing change is something we all struggle with. Even as adults who have experienced many changes over the years, including those we welcome, change is challenging.

Therefore, we should not be surprised when youth resist, stall, avoid, or try to negotiate their way out of making a change. Humans are creatures of habit and life's transitions regularly disrupt our comfort.

As adults we have experienced a lifetime of transitions and developed skills and an understanding to manage change. Youth, on the other hand, are still developing those skills. For youth, many transitions they experience

are significant and they need guidance in adjusting to a new environment or situation. These challenges are amplified in teens who, at the same time, are experiencing physiological, social, and relationship changes.

Common transitions youth experience relate to school including advancing to the next grade level, returning after summer break, starting in a new school, or entering higher education. During these times it is important to remind them they have made it through many transitions throughout their life and they will make it through the current one.

As a parent, guardian, family member or youth program leader, it is important to recognize present and approaching transitions to best support, guide, and teach

youth as they move through and towards change.

Here are some tips you can use to lessen their feelings of uncertainty during a challenging transition:

Encourage and welcome feelings.

Youth experience many emotions during a transition. Allowing them to have and express their feelings without discrediting or trivializing them is important.

Listen to understand.

Give them your undivided attention and carefully listen to their concerns. Identifying and validating their fears helps them to feel understood, keeps lines of communication open, and involves them in problem solving and identifying possible solutions.

Uphold expectations.

Lowering expectations during a challenging time reduces stability. Not only are they struggling through a challenging time, but now they are unsure of boundaries and expectations. Be consistent with consequences when behaviors cross the line.

Share decision making.

Times of transition can create in youth a sense of loss of control. When possible and at a level both parties are comfortable, engage in shared

decision-making. Allow them to voice opinions, make choices, and offer possible solutions.

Be realistically positive.

Give them examples of past accomplishments to remind them of when they have overcome past challenges. Focus on things going well by acknowledging change is difficult, while encouraging them to consider the positive things they will experience from the transition.

Model calm behavior.

Youth take cues from those around them. Even though you may be anxious, it is important you reflect a healthy attitude toward change. Avoid letting your concerns negatively impact their experience.

Avoid anxiety-provoking questions.

Ask open-ended questions and avoid stress causing statements. They might not be concerned about something until you give them a reason to be ("Are you nervous about making new friends?" or "High school teachers have much higher expectations").

Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) is a leadership program for high school youth from across the country. Every summer, thousands of young people participate in this week long program. CWF provides opportunities for youth to broaden: appreciation and practice respect for themselves and others in their world; increase individual commitment to citizen involvement; and understand the importance of civic and social responsibilities as they relate to the development of better citizens and leaders. Time is provided for 4-H members to report accomplishments in 4-H to their representatives in the Washington, D.C., area as well as participate in sightseeing trips. Registration is due October 15, 2021. Contact your County Extension Office at <https://aces.nmsu.edu/county/> for more information about CWF. CWF will return to in-person programming in the Washington, D.C. metro area in Summer 2022.

4-H Home Economics Lettermen

Any 4-H Member who is active in Home Economics Projects may “letter” in Home Economics. All that is necessary to “letter” is to complete the requirements in their age level and submit the appropriate forms to their County Extension Office by September 1. The first year a member letters they receive a “clover” letter as you would see on a lettermen jacket. Bronze, Silver, and Gold pins in the shape of the letter “H” are awarded in the respective age levels. A member can “letter” at any time, even if they did not begin as a novice, but they will receive the pin for the appropriate age level. In addition, two platinum letters will be awarded each year in the form of a plaque. The platinum letters are based on overall achievement and may be received at any age level. Platinum awards are selected from all applications submitted in that 4-H program year. For information on how to “letter” and appropriate application forms, refer to the State 4-H website or contact your County Extension Office.

Seek help.

If you feel their anxiety level is beyond your ability to manage, seek help. A professional is equipped with the skills and experience to help youth manage their anxiety and guide them through a challenging transition.

Change throughout life is certain. Demonstrate to youth that change is a natural part of growing up and life. By teaching youth how to accept, plan, and adjust to change instead of reacting, will not only benefit and prepare them now, but for the many life changes yet to come.

Categories:

- Landscapes - Any pictures that have fields, any type of vegetation, flowers, mountains, sunsets, etc.
- Buildings - Any picture that have buildings
- Other -Anything that doesn't fit in a category

Entry rules:

- Members may submit up to a total of three entries. Each entry must have the following information with it—Name, Club, County, Name of Photo, Category, Location of the photo and Contact number/email.
- Entries can be either color or black and white. Please no edited or photo-shopped pictures.
- Please, no matted or framed photos if mailed.
- Photos will not be returned! If you want to keep your photo, please retain a copy.
- Photographs must be the work of the 4-H member taken during the current 4-H program year.
